Portfolio Description

The portfolio invests in global shares predominantly in emerging markets by selecting and weighting companies based on fundamental measures of company size.

Investment Strategy

Realindex forms a universe of companies based on accounting measures. Factors such as quality, near-term value and momentum are applied to form a final portfolio of companies. This fund does not hedge currency risk.

Investment Objective

To provide capital and income growth by investing in global shares predominantly in emerging markets and outperforming the MSCI Emerging Markets Index, over rolling five year periods before fees and taxes.

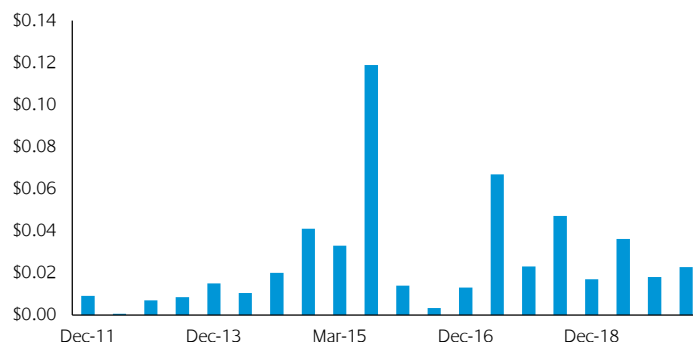

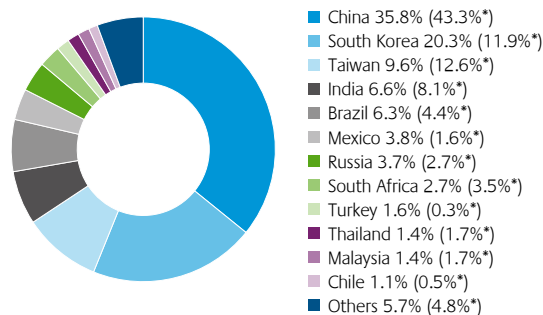

Realindex Emerging Markets Fund-Class A

The Realindex Emerging Markets Fund returned +2.51% (net of fees) during October, versus the MSCI Emerging Markets Net Index which returned +4.17% (in AUD).

Value stocks underperformed Growth stocks by 3.1% over the month (MSCI Emerging Markets Value +2.5% vs. Growth +5.6%, in AUD). Over the past year, the magnitude of the Value headwind has been considerable; Value has underperformed Growth by 33.8% (MSCI Emerging Markets Value -10.2% vs. Growth +23.6%, in AUD). On a five year basis, Value lags Growth by 9.3% p.a. (AUD) providing a significant longer-term performance headwind.

The month was characterised by rising volatility in markets and falling oil prices as pandemic fears of further lockdowns in Europe and a US fiscal stimulus package not passing stifled the initial gains made in equity markets earlier in the month. Emerging markets staged stronger performances off the back of positive earnings revisions led by Asia (MSCI China +7.5% in AUD terms).

On a country basis, the largest contributor was the overweight to Korea and the largest detractor was the underweight to China. From a sector perspective, the largest contributor was the overweight to Financials and the largest detractor was the underweight to Communication Services. The largest stock level contributor was the overweight to Great Wall Motor Co., Ltd. and the largest stock level detractor was the underweight to Tencent.

Driven by the methodology of rebalancing further into cheap value companies, the portfolio continues to sit on deep valuation discounts. At the end of October 2020 the portfolio reflected a 87.2% dividend yield premium to the MSCI EM index, whilst trading at a 57.2% price to book discount, a 59.3% price to cashflow discount and 66.9% price to sales discount, indicating that the portfolio remains well positioned for mean reversion in Value.

Portfolio Beta measures the portfolio's sensitivity to benchmark movements. Mathematically, it is the covariance of the portfolio vs the benchmark divided by the variance of the benchmark. The covariance and variance are ex ante calculations based on current weights and historic patterns of return over the past five years.

Turnover is the average of sales and purchases divided by the average portfolio size.

Cashflow Adjusted Turnover is the same as above, except that the lesser of sales and purchases is used in place of the average of the two. This is to adjust for turnover that is related to investing inflows or selling stocks to meet outflows rather than related to active management of the portfolio.

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
